

The 4 R's

- Reuse
- Revise
- Remix
- Redistribute

Reuse

the right to reuse the content in its unaltered / verbatim form (e.g., make a backup copy of the content)

Revise

the right to adapt, adjust, modify, or alter the content itself (e.g., translate the content into another language)

Remix

the right to combine the original or revised content with other content to create something new (e.g., incorporate the content into a mashup)

Redistribute

the right to share copies of the original content, your revisions, or your remixes with others (e.g., give a copy of the content to a friend)

Copyright is confusing


