



Creator+ Inserting Callouts

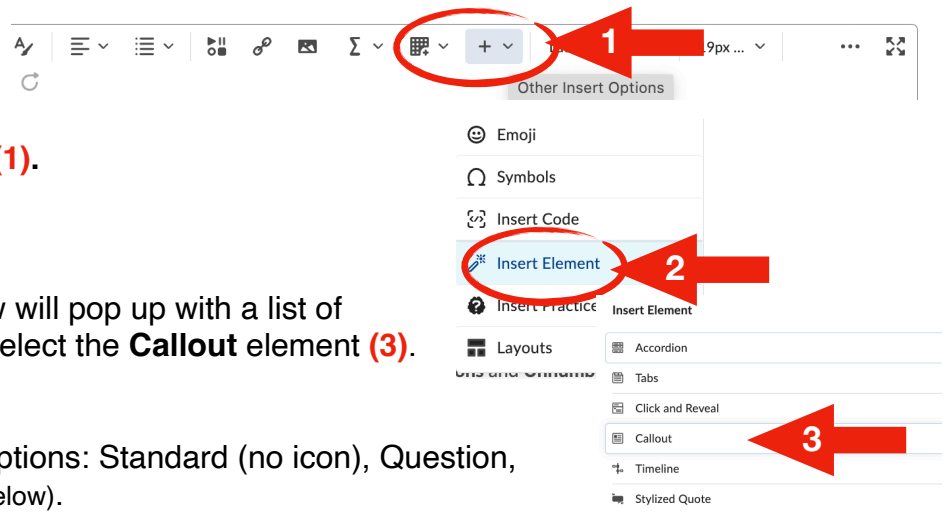
A callout is a bordered rectangle. It separates the content within the rectangle from the rest of the content. Callouts are useful for drawing attention to a key detail or an aside to the primary content, like a case study, definition, or anecdote.

To Insert a Callout:

In the page editing window, click on the **Other Insert Options** icon on the **Editor Ribbon** (1).

Select **Insert Element** (2).

The **Insert Element** window will pop up with a list of Elements to choose from. Select the **Callout** element (3).




With Callouts, you have 4 options: Standard (no icon), Question, Attention, and Jumbo (see below).

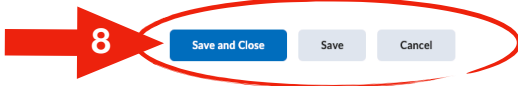
